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Editorial: Our Side of the Story



The above statement correctly describes what happened locally with the creation of the Liverpool Supporters' Club Gozo in 1997. Never in a million years could I have predicted that this venue was to introduce me to some of the most passionate and great characters on the island as well as to offer me some of the best football-related experiences of my life!

Early Days

A room next to the terrace on the first floor of a beautiful corner house was transformed into a meeting place. Its empty walls soon started filling up with signed photos of past and present Liverpool FC players. The bar started out as a table





in a corner. The first live matches were followed on a screen. Large cabinets were ordered to house replicas of famous cups as well as all types of memorabilia. A replica of the Shankly Gates was engraved and installed, Shankly's statue was stationed in front of the house to guard the premises whilst Liverpool's famous "You'll Never Walk Alone" was carved in stone right beneath the club window. A committee was elected and a statute was adopted. Relations with our Maltese counterparts were rekindled and contacts with the mother club were launched.

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Kopites from near and far have flocked to this shrine to follow their beloved team. The club has been a place of celebration as well as a place for discussion. It's also in the club that tears have been shed and dreams have been shattered. This is not to mention that several ex-players have been welcomed here, be it on official visits or as guests. Likewise, thanks to the exceptional relationship which exists between the LSC Gozo and the club in Malta, local Liverpool supporters can proudly say that they have managed to lift the FA Cup, the League Cup, the UEFA Champions League Cup, the UEFA Cup (nowadays known as the Europa League) and the UEFA Super Cup. Only a small fraction of the players who play in the English Premier League have managed to lay their hands on one of these cups; however, we can boastfully say that we have held them all! That's the extent of the club's esteem abroad. The club, which can also be considered as a museum, is now the pride of all the supporters' clubs on the island.





Publication

The articles in this magazine are intended to tell the story of the club in the form of personal accounts. Simply listing all the events which took place during the past twenty years would have rendered the magazine boring and unappealing. It would have been the perfect fact file. On the contrary, I wanted the people who make up the club to feel fully involved; to recount the club's history through their first-hand experiences. 

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You'll Never Walk Alone





Celebrating twenty years is indeed an achievement! How could I have predicted this when my friend Charlie Farrugia decided to open the club in Xewkija? From humble beginnings, the club has developed into one of the best venues where to watch football and where other fund-raising activities related to Liverpool FC are regularly organised.

However, if I were to go back in time, let's say about three to four decades ago, the idea of a Liverpool Supporters' Club had already existed on the island. At that time the perception of a supporters' club was very different from that of today. Nowadays, supporters' clubs are affiliated with the mother club and have to adhere to strict regulations to qualify as an official club. The present club has its official premises with a functioning committee elected by vote every year. But in the late 1970s, with no official premises available, Liverpool supporters, we, used to meet at the Oratory Don Bosco, which served as an unofficial Liverpool Supporters' Club. I used to act as the barman and did my utmost to present an image of a supporters' club. In fact, I had adorned the bar with Liverpool photos, banners, scarves, players' posters and a set of red lights to create a Red atmosphere. Screening of matches was in black and white and live games were a rarity. We did our best to watch what was shown on television: European Cup Final matches, FA Cup Finals and the weekly Star Soccer, later on called

Big League Soccer, which showed the highlights of only one match a week after it had actually been played. One cannot compare today's availability of live football with the scarcity of what was available at the time. This highlights our dedication and love for the game, especially for Liverpool FC. Moreover, during those times, when the internet was still unheard of, several Liverpool supporters used to gather in anticipation around the phone every Saturday at around six in the





evening while I phoned the local radio station in Malta to ask for Liverpool's result. One can only imagine the air of anticipation which filled the room until the final result came through.

In addition, Mr George Mizzi, an ex-committee member, together with several others, included, used to myself attend meetings for Liverpool fans in Valletta. These meetings were held by Mr Alfred Fenech, one of the founders of the Liverpool Supporters' Club Malta. Knowing how hard it was for Gozitans to travel to Malta in those days, Alfred used to be delighted to see us present for most of the meetings. I clearly remember what Mr Alfred Fenech used to say when we arrived for a meeting: 'Ma għidtilkomx li jiġu 'l Għawdxin!' meaning 'Didn't I tell you that the would Gozitans come!' This also demonstrates the friendship and bond which existed and still prevails to



this day between the two Liverpool Supporters' Clubs on the islands.

Moreover, with the help of the Oratory Don Bosco Sports Board, football leagues used to be organised between local supporters who supported different teams representing European clubs. I vividly remember the two leagues won by what we used to call the

Liverpool team, a team made up of several Liverpool supporters who competed against other supporters of English, Italian or Spanish teams. Several Liverpool supporters who took part in that league would later on form part of the committee of the Liverpool Supporters' Club Gozo.

Twenty years as an official club is quite a milestone! Each Liverpool supporter should remember that the Liverpool heart had been beating long before the present Liverpool opened Supporters' Club its doors. It is thanks to the supporters and many others who passionately supported Liverpool during the years, that we now have one of the best supporters' clubs on the island.

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My Liverpool Home

The premises of the Liverpool Supporters' Club Gozo in Xewkija form part of Mr Charlie Farrugia's house. In this interview with the editor, he shares his thoughts as the club owner.

How did you fall in love with the boys in red?

It all started way back during the 1976/77 football season. I was 10 years old and Kevin Keegan was my idol. He was one of the best players in Europe at the time. My best friend, Giovann Cassar, who supported Manchester United, tried to convince me to support the Red Devils but the team of the moment was Liverpool. They were on top and nothing would change my mind.

What inspired you to open the club?

When I fell in love with Liverpool FC, they had just won their tenth league and were also crowned champions









of Europe for the first time. Being quite young, I used to frequent local football clubs and band clubs where I used to meet other Liverpool supporters from around Gozo. There always seemed to be the need for a club where everyone could meet, as was the case in Valletta.


In 1983 I moved to New York where I still kept on following the team, in the company of other Liverpool supporters in Astoria. I always dreamt of opening a club in New York. In fact, while still in New York, I had already contacted Mr Brian Hall who was in favour of my idea and was also willing to help me.

In 1996, when I came back to Malta, I learned that the club in Valletta had closed down and was replaced by the one in Mosta. Back in Gozo, Dr Chris Said, a local lawyer, contacted me with the intention of forming a Liverpool Supporters' Club in Gozo. I informed him that it was my dream to open such a club and that I already had contacts abroad. We



decided to hold a meeting for local Liverpool supporters in his office in Victoria and during that meeting the first committee was elected. I also informed all those present that, as I was building a new house in Xewkija, I was ready to allocate a room for the club. My dream had come true and the club opened its doors in 1997.

For some time the club was officially recognised as a branch in Gozo of the Liverpool Supporters' Club Malta and on the 29th of June 1999, two Liverpool legends, Mr Phil Thompson and Mr Sammy Lee officially

Whoever visits the club is stunned by the amount of memorabilia on show. Is this your private collection?

Yes, most of the stuff on display is mine, especially the old items. I bought all these items from the souvenir catalogue the club used to issue around three to four times a year. I have photos, pennants and match day programmes which date way back to 1976/77. I still buy such items to add to my collection. Over the years, the committee has also managed to invest in some memorabilia, after gaining the necessary funds from activities organised during the season. The cup replicas are an example of this.






















Who are the people behind the club in Gozo?

The club's foundations are all its members, especially committee the members, Without including me. members or a committee, there wouldn't be a solid basis for a club to move forward. That's one of the factors the club is well known for. Although it's been quite some time since we saw some silverware, its loyal supporters have never ceased to back their beloved team. Our premises have never been left empty for a match, even though the team doesn't always get the desired results. On the contrary, I believe that attendances at the club have increased over the years. I just can't imagine what would have happened if Liverpool had won as many honours as other teams across the continent. I would also like to thank my wife Josephine who has been very supportive throughout all these years.

How would you rate the local fans' expectations?

They're demanding but understanding well. as At the beginning of each football season, it is every supporter's dream to win the English Premier League and to progress as far as possible all cup competitions. Even though there's a good number of supporters who are old enough to remember Liverpool's last league won, generation new supporters are still to witness this. The fact that all the cups Liverpool have won during these last twenty years have made it to the club in Gozo fills everyone with hope that, once Liverpool win the coveted Premier League, the cup will visit us as well.

Do team performances affect club attendance?

Yes they do, but the number of supporters who attend the club regularly has always been encouraging. Around one hundred supporters pay their membership fee every year and one third of them are ever-present for Liverpool's games, irrespective of the result Liverpool managed to get during the last game. This fills me with hope for the future. As I have already mentioned before, there's a growing





number of young supporters who are always at the club. This confirms the club's popularity here in Gozo. I always hope that this number will increase. Furthermore, the constant demand for match tickets is another indicator of the club's strength in Gozo.

The premises have changed drastically since the club opened its doors. One could say that it's constantly being upgraded. Are there any plans for the future?

Most of the money generated from membership fees and fund-raising activities has been invested in the premises. It is there for all to see. The barren room I dedicated as a club has now become a sort of museum, the pride of all Liverpool supporters in Gozo. Whoever pays it a visit is amazed.

The new modern look given to the club is proof that the club is constantly changing. Recently, the terrace next to the club has been refurbished. It has been roofed and garden furniture has been installed. It has become very popular with the young supporters who regularly come to watch the games.

Future plans include a new bar as well as a new electronic noticeboard. I'm fed up of climbing ladders to physically change our team's opponents on the current noticeboard stuck underneath the club's window. At times, I have to do it twice a week. Modern technology is much safer and more comfortable and I intend to start making full use of it soon. One of the latest decisions taken by the committee is to install a new gate right outside the club to commemorate the 96 supporters who lost their lives at Hillsborough.

Liverpool has become your second home. Would you consider moving to the city?

It's true! I have visited the city so many times that I really consider it my second home. I go there around six or seven times a year to watch the team play. Unfortunately, my business



commitment is keeping me here at the moment but when I retire, I plan to visit more regularly, trying to fly in for Liverpool's games at the weekend. I have friends over there who I can meet.

What is your message to all Liverpool supporters?

Never give up, let's keep on working together. We have to be patient. It's true that it's not nice to sell players but ultimately nobody's greater than the club. Financial limitations may keep us from being the richest club on the planet but nobody beats Liverpool's fan-base across the world.

At the moment, the team seems to be on the right track. Klopp is building a very good team as he's changing players in every department. It's true that sometimes we don't agree with his decisions but ultimately he's the boss. He knows what he's doing.

Liverpool's name frequently makes headlines on the papers alongside other established names. Other teams, especially in Europe, never like facing our strong side. Even though we might not be the finished article, we seem to be getting there.

Apart from running the club in Gozo, Charlie has been a member on the committee at the Liverpool Supporters' Club Malta since the year 2000, occupying the post of Chairperson for the last 9 years.



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International Supporters' Official (ISC) Clubs / Liverpool Supporters' Clubs (OLSC) Network

Liverpool FC is undoubtedly one of the best supported clubs in the world. Its fan includes more than base 270 officially recognized Liverpool Supporters' Clubs in at least 88 countries spread over all the continents, with Europe boasting the most Liverpool supporters' clubs followed by America and Asia.



Unofficial LFC Supporters' Clubs started forming back in the late 1960s. In 1993, Liverpool FC took a decision to provide official statuses to these groups, with the creation of the International Supporters Clubs (ISC) network, known today as the OLSC network.

We, Liverpool FC fans, are famous the world over. What sets us apart from every other football club in the world is our loyalty, passion and knowledge. We have been instrumental in every great and famous victory that the team has had and have been the core strength in moments of great sorrow and huge loss. Although the management of each supporters' club differs throughout the world, all OLSC

branches are created to give valuable service to its members and to allow supporters to come together and celebrate the club they love as a family in that particular area. All OLSC branches also provide an excellent way of meeting fellow supporters and likeminded people, all of whom are devoted to following Liverpool FC, wherever they live in the world.

Liverpool Supporters' Club Gozo

Twenty years ago, a group of Liverpool supporters in Gozo decided to begin the process of forming a supporters' club on the island. Charlie Farrugia offered part of his premises to function as the club's premises, which has since then, been equipped with the latest technology for all supporters to come and watch Liverpool play. Once the club started functioning, the committee in Gozo faced a slight problem. It was informed that there couldn't be two supporters' clubs on the Maltese Islands as

there already was an existing supporters' club in Malta. Both sets of committees met in Malta and it was decided that our club would be considered as a branch of the Liverpool Supporters' Club Malta. It was also decided that the International Supporters' Clubs in Liverpool would be informed about this decision.

The club in Gozo continued to be listed as an official branch under that of Malta on the Official LFC website for around eight years. However, in 2006, the committee at that time decided to contact club officials in Liverpool inquiring if it were possible for the club to be obtain official recognition The committee was informed that by paying the sum of around £100 per year for affiliation, it would be officially recognised by the mother club in Liverpool. This is due to the fact that the premises were based on another island. After yet another meeting with the committee from the Liverpool Supporters' Club Malta, it was decided that for





the financial benefit of both clubs, it was worth having two officially recognized clubs on the Maltese Islands.

Running of the club

The club's committee elected during an annual General Meeting. The club members elect ten or eleven members to manage the club for the following year. The committee's main responsibility is to manage the club in the best possible way during that year. The posts of chairman, secretary, treasurer and other responsibilities are designated to the committee members during one of its first meetings with meetings taking place monthly, sometimes more frequently depending on the urgency of the decisions needed to be taken. The chairman is not only responsible for running the meetings but also ensures that all committee members fulfil their duties diligently. Since the club's inception, there have been five different chairmen, with another twenty different members who have formed part of the committee during these past twenty years.

Memberships

Each member becomes a club member by paying an annual fee. Members may also become LFC Official Members by paying a small annual fee. They receive an LFC official membership card, an exclusive membership pack full of LFC merchandise, have access to over 10,000 tickets for every Liverpool home game and may benefit from discounts when buying LFC merchandise from the Official LFC store.



The club encourages all its members to pay the LFC Official membership since its benefits far outweigh the annual fee paid. It also helps our supporters feel part of the worldwide Liverpool family and closer to the club we all love.

One Great Big Family

It is always a great feeling for the fans to become officially recognised by the club. Even though our beloved team is based in England, its fame has spread so much that its fans can now be found everywhere around the world. It is quite fulfilling to see fans from all over the world joining our big family and we all hope that the club's fan base continues to grow stronger.

Last January, when welcoming 11 new supporters' clubs, Peter Moore, chief executive officer of Liverpool FC told the club's official website: "We're absolutely delighted to welcome these new Official Liverpool FC Supporters' Clubs to the LFC family. As a Reds fan who lived abroad for many years, I know firsthand what it's like to support the club from afar, so it's really great to see so many of these groups come together to share their love of our club and recreate the special Anfield atmosphere wherever they are in the world."












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Messages by the LSC Gozo Chairpersons

The football season 1992-1993 saw the introduction of the Premier League in England. This decision was brought about by the clubs in the old First Division who wanted to break away from the Football League and take advantage of the monetary injection derived through television rights. Today's abundant availability of live football matches is the result of that arrangement ...

Childhood Memories

For me, football is more than just a game: it's a way of life. This is especially true since I happen to live on an island where the love for the game is nearly as important as religion: only politics does it better. As a football club, Liverpool FC has had its fair share of ups and downs and as an ardent fan, I can proudly state that I have lived through some of the club's most memorable achievements and unfortunately, through their bad patches and downfalls as well.

It all started way back in the 1980s. Like the majority of kids at the time, football in general used to amaze me but in those days live matches on television were a rarity. So, my only links with the game across the continent were through magazines in the like of Shoot and Match while my favourite sports programme was called Big League Soccer. Who can ever forget Brian Moore's voice? No wonder he was called the voice of soccer! This programme was aired once a week on the only local television station available to the nation, TVM. All the action, goals and drama of the old First Division in England had to be followed more than a week after the games had actually been played, not to mention this was also subject to availability! Luckily enough, Télé Monte-Carlo (TMC), a free-to-air television station based in the Principality of Monaco, used to cover a few FA Cup games. Meanwhile, the FA Cup final used to be

broadcasted live on our local television station.

Falling in Love with the Game

At such a young age, the only two people I shared this pastime with were my dad, who happens to be a true Red Devil but also a genuine fan of English football in general and my grandpa, who was a Real Madrid and Spain national team diehard. Sharing the sitting room with them meant complicated listening to football arguments regarding the level of football in England and in Spain. It must have been this banter that instilled in me an outstanding passion for the game.

Next came the World Cup in Mexico in 1986. This football feast guaranteed a whole month of live football on television. This was my first experience of watching live football matches with huge interest. I hardly missed a match even though some of







the games were played early in the morning due to the local time zone difference. How can I forget the penalty shootout between Brazil and France, the 'Hand of God', the way Maradona dominated the whole tournament and the six goals scored by Lineker? Moreover, the Panini sticker album, which I still collect to date, undoubtedly had a major influence on me as well.

Becoming a Red

Nevertheless, it must have been the FA Cup Final, which had been played a month prior to the World Cup, which had a significant impact on me. Liverpool and Everton challenged each other in a final for the first time at Wembley. The nature of the game, being one-nil down by halftime, then turning the result in their favour to win the cup, reiterated Liverpool's neversay-die attitude. Moreover, the fact that Liverpool had Kenny Dalglish as a playermanager, a key player as well as a very young manager when compared with others in top clubs, fascinated me. It must have been these factors that made me fall in love with the club. From that day onwards, I did my best to keep track of Liverpool's progress in the league on a regular basis. I considered the likes of Beardsley, McMahon, Whelan, Rush, Houghton and especially Barnes, which was also my school nickname for a few years, as my idols.

Unfortunately, my early days as a Liverpool supporter were marked in sorrow as well: the Heysel Stadium disaster in 1985; the Hillsborough disaster in 1989; losing the 1988 FA cup final to Wimbledon and losing the 1988-89 title in the last seconds of the match against Arsenal at Anfield, still haunt me to this day. To top it all off, Liverpool were banned from all European cup competitions for six years due to the disaster in

Heysel, virtually destroying my dream of witnessing success in Europe during my teenage years. However, I stuck to the team and never considered changing allegiances, even though Italian football was at its best and easily available on the box.

A Dream Come True

As I grew older, match days for me meant driving around the island to any one of the popular places where football was on live: the Aurora Snack Bar, the Xewkija Band Club, the Oratory Youths Bar and the Nadur Band Club were amongst Gozo's best places to watch football. However, something was still missing. The dream of being able to watch Liverpool play with a bunch of true Liverpool supporters still lingered in my mind. I longed for a place where I could share my joys and sorrows with local Kopites.

Mv dream came true in mid-nineties when a meeting was held in a local lawyer's office with the intent of forming a club in Gozo. When I heard the news, I was overjoyed to say the least. The void I had felt as a little kid was over. Finally, there was going to be a place where I could watch Liverpool's matches in the company of persons who shared my own belief. Thanks goes to Charlie Farrugia and his wife Josephine, who made all this possible by offering part of their home to us Liverpool supporters. Today, this is where I regularly meet Liverpool







fans who come from all over the world and with whom I've become close friends. That short meeting made history.

Twenty years later, I can proudly state that I form part of the committee of the best supporters' club on the island. It is where I hang out during Liverpool matches, it's my favourite watering hole. I have witnessed the club's development over the years and thanks to the commitment of ever-increasing our members, I believe that the club will continue to be the local Liverpool supporters' 'home' for years to come.

This article recounts my journey to follow my favourite team, from the moment I fell in love with the game up to today. I'm quite confident that most of you will associate themselves with the story and claim that it's theirs as well.

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Liverpool FC in Malta

January 2000

Liverpool FC's shock home defeat in the FA Cup against Blackburn Rovers meant that the team hadn't made it beyond the fourth round for the fifth season in a row. Locally, everybody was in the doldrums as the club had not seen any silverware since April 1995 when Liverpool FC beat Bolton Wanderers 2-0 in the League Cup Final.

To top it all off, Malta was chosen as their destination! No words can describe what we all felt at being told that our beloved team would be training amongst us. Preparations hit a high

Even though the team didn't make it to Gozo, we made sure that they were aware about our presence when we visited them at Ta' Qali for a training session and later on at the Corinthia San Gorg Hotel in St. Julian's for a squad presentation. Under David Moores' watchful eyes, Gerard Houllier gave total liberty to all the players to take photos with us as well as to sign autographs to all those who wanted. The whole squad was surprised by the local knowledge regarding the team, especially with the songs normally heard on the Kop.

The team's visit was every supporters' dream come true!





















We Won It Five Times

With a history spanning over 125 years, during which 41 major honours have been won, Liverpool is considered as one of the most successful football clubs in the world.

Club honours

Domestically, Liverpool boast 18 league championships to their name, only the Premier League title still eludes them. Liverpool have However. managed to claim seven FA Cup wins. Two of these followed successes cup Merseyside derbies played at Wembley Stadium in the 1980s with the last two cup victories unfolding against Arsenal in 2001 and West Ham in 2006. Both these finals had dramatic endings to them.

No other team comes close to Liverpool's tally of eight League Cups, which have been won over the course of 12 final appearances. This success at home has enabled Liverpool to play in the season's curtain-raiser several times. In fact, the Reds have managed to get their hands on 15 Charity/Community Shields over the years, either



by winning the trophy outright or, as was the case before, by sharing it with another team following a draw.

Liverpool have also been very successful in Europe, having proudly won 5 European Cups to date. No other British team has managed that much success. The first European Cup success came under Bob Paisley, who added two more trophies to the trophy cabinet before his successor Joe Fagan also won the famous cup. The most recent triumph came in 2005, when Rafael Benitez oversaw the Miracle of Istanbul.

On a slightly lighter tone, Liverpool have won the UEFA Cup on three separate occasions. Bill Shankly, Bob Paisley and Gerard Houllier all led their teams to the trophy, the latter thanks to a 5-4 win over Alaves in one of the most incredible European finals of all time. To top it all off, two of Liverpool's UEFA Cup victories and one European Cup win were followed with success in the season-opening UEFA Super Cup.

Luckily enough, eleven of the above accomplishments were witnessed at the club in Gozo since opening its doors in 1997.





The Cups in Gozo

All the team's successes have, undoubtedly, been celebrated worldwide but only a few supporters' clubs around the world could say that they have organised activities to celebrate in the presence of the official cups. In fact, all the cups won by Liverpool FC since the turning of the century have been brought over to our island. It was thanks to Mr Phil Thompson's promise during the club's official

inauguration in June 1999 that the UEFA Cup, nowadays known as the UEFA Europa League Cup, the FA Cup and the League Cup made their way to Malta and Gozo in 2001. In 2006, Liverpool FC museum curator, Mr Stephen Done and his assistant, Mr Steve Newton brought the UEFA Champions League Cup and the UEFA Super Cup to Malta and Gozo. This is tangible proof of the level of respect and esteem our club benefits from.

































Following the Reds


The opening of the club in Gozo brought about several opportunities: its close ties with the mother club have enabled local supporters to obtain tickets to go and watch their favourite team play. As a matter of fact, I have been to a Liverpool game at least once a year since the year 2000. My loyal support has taken me further as I have witnessed 5 cup finals namely the:

2003 League Cup Final against Manchester United in Cardiff;
2005 League Cup Final against Chelsea in Cardiff;
2005 UEFA Champions League Cup Final against Milan in Istanbul;
2007 UEFA Champions League Cup Final against Milan in Athens;
2016 UEFA Europa League Cup Final against Sevilla in Basel.

During my visits to Lancashire, I was lucky enough to go to Melwood a couple of times to see the players train and I even managed to meet most of the players and the managers. I also visited many stadiums, not to mention the privilege of sitting all over Anfield. While sitting in the away section against Charlton in 2003, I was lucky enough to be captured by a British photographer, just as Michael Owen slid his penalty into the bottom corner of the net. Unfortunately, we ended up losing 3-2 on the day. My latest experience in the Hospitality Lounge in the new Main Stand at Anfield has given me a taste of the huge investments by the club to give more quality for money to each supporter.


Personal experience

April 2004 marked the 15th Anniversary of the Hillsborough disaster. Having travelled to the city with a close friend for a couple of matches, we made it a point to be present for the memorial which was held at Anfield. We sat in the Kop that day, but boy, what a difference! Instead of the usual deafening noise coming from the fans, it was the eerie silence that filled the air that got to me. So solemn, so calm and so sad. However, I believe that my presence there was enough to console the families who









were commemorating the loss of their dear ones, who had gone to a football match but never made it back home.

As for excitement, I'll never forget the build-up to the UEFA Champions League Cup Final in 2005. I was lucky enough to be accredited by UEFA and saw the players train in the Ataturk Stadium the day before the match. I was also present for both press conferences given by Rafa Benitez, one on the eve of the match and the other after the success in Istanbul. I heard Gerrard issue the famous statement: 'How can I ever leave Liverpool after a night like this?' This contrasted sharply with my experience of Chelsea's supporters singing Gerrard's name after Chelsea beat Liverpool in the League Cup Final in 2005. It was heart-breaking because, at the time, there were rumours that Gerrard was about to join them. Moreover, seeing Mourinho tapping Gerrard's shoulder felt so agonising. Anyway, let bygones be bygones as that's history now.

Nothing beats Istanbul! But beating Manchester United and Everton are amongst the best experiences as well. I'll never forget watching Suarez single-handedly demolish Manchester United at Anfield, in the process of helping Dirk Kuyt score a hat-trick under King Kenny's second coming. Another electrifying atmosphere I experienced in the Kop was when Liverpool played Everton in 2006. Liverpool had Steven Gerrard sent off in the 18th minute but still managed to beat the Toffeemen 3-1.

Unfortunately, I was present for Gerrard's famous slip against Chelsea too. I never felt so low and my stomach churned the moment I saw Demba Ba dash towards goal. I couldn't come to terms with the defeat for days. But nothing would stop me from returning to the UK two weeks later for the final home game against Newcastle. I wanted to show my appreciation to my beloved team for the great season we had, this in spite of losing the league by just two points to Manchester City.

Local vibe

Even though I have had my fair share of globetrotting, my presence at the club in Xewkija for Liverpool's games is unrelenting. I can say that I've experienced some of the best European nights at the club as well. Victories over AC Roma, FC Barcelona, Internazionale FC, Real Madrid, Olympiakos FC, Borussia Dortmund and Manchester United are unforgettable. Each night has its own story! The atmosphere at the club is incomparable as nobody can celebrate like Liverpudlians do.

Liverpool is a team just like no other. I must admit that falling in love with the team has made me fall in love with the city, with its life. And as the Shanky quote states, I believe that ... "I was made for Liverpool and Liverpool was made for me!"

Anfield Beat

The most important activity organised each year is the Annual General Meeting. This yearly meeting which is usually organised in July, is the main activity where members may voice their concerns regarding how the club is managed and where each supporter can give suggestions for the club to move forward. During this meeting, all members present discuss both the financial and administrative aspects of the club and also elect the



committee to manage the club for the following year.

Several ex-Liverpool players have graced our club and have had the opportunity to admire all the mementos and memorabilia on display. Amongst these, one can find Phil Thompson, Sammy Lee, Phil Neal, **David** Fairclough, Alan Kennedy, Ian Callaghan, Jimmy Case, David Johnson, Craig

Bellamy, Patrick Berger and Vladimir Smicer, joined by several Liverpool youth players including John Flanagan, a youth player at the time of his visit, who later on made it to the first team.

Since its inception in 1997, the club has managed to organise two annual dinners, one during the Christmas period and another just after Easter. These group gatherings have always been a great success, especially the Christmas Dinner. On the 7th December 2012, a dinner reception was held by the club to celebrate its 15th Anniversary. Liverpool's all-time leadina current top scorer, lan Rush was in attendance. During his visit, Rush officially inaugurated a replica of the great Bill Shankly statue found at Anfield. This replica, along with a replica of the Shankly gates, can be found guarding the club's premises in Xewkija.

Looking back at these twenty years, one can surely be impressed by the great strides forward that have been accomplished by the club within such a short period of time. It is thanks to all the club members that the club has continued to flourish year after year and this special bond between all members certainly augurs well for the club's future.





LFC Academy and Foundation Coaches in Gozo

The LFC International Soccer School, spearheaded by Mr Frank Skelley, visited our island three times in 2004, 2005 and 2011. These visits were organised in collaboration with the Liverpool Supporters' Club Malta. Several youth coaches from the Liverpool Academy organised training sessions aimed at children aged between 10 and 15 years. All these training sessions were a great success, with children from major nurseries in Gozo attending. Following these training sessions, three participants from Gozo namely Luke Vella, Rueben Farrugia and Keeva Camilleri, together with other Maltese entrants, were chosen to attend and train at the Liverpool FC Academy for a week.

































Interview With Mr David Johnson

David Edward Johnson, born 23rd October 1951 in Liverpool, England, was a forward who won major trophies for Liverpool FC in the 1970s and 1980s. Amongst the clubs he featured for, one can find Everton and Ipswich Town. Surprisingly enough, David ended his football career playing for Naxxar Lions in Malta. Pierre Camilleri had the opportunity to have a few words with him.

What inspired you to play football?

Where I come from, when we were young, football was how boys played. We didn't have computers, Game Boy or PlayStation®; we grew up playing in the streets. Every possible moment was dedicated to football. Either you had a talent or you didn't. I was good enough and lucky enough to represent Liverpool Schoolboys and we won the English Schools' Trophy aged 14, which is the biggest schools trophy in the UK. And because I did that, I had the opportunity to join Everton. I must say that my mum and dad were my biggest inspiration because they were always there for me. They stood on the pitch side, rain or shine and backed me all the time.



What is the one thing that you enjoyed while playing football?

There are so many things. When you become a professional footballer, a lot of the enjoyment fades because it becomes your job. A lot of supporters can't understand that, but it's a full-time job where you're constantly being told to do a certain thing in a certain way, every single day! That's why it is not as enjoyable as many people think. However, travelling and

becoming known enable you to make more friends. Obviously, it's nice to be recognised. It's a very good barrier-breaker. It gives you something to talk about with whoever you're with. So, playing football is not just one thing, it's all of them. It's something special.

Who were your football idols when you were growing up?

My brothers took me to Anfield and I stood on the Kop. As I was a striker, my idol was Sir Roger Hunt and obviously Ian St John, his co-partner. So, I would say that Hunt and St John were my childhood idols, especially from Liverpool.

What are some of the lessons you've learned during your career?

Playing football is not easy. Everyone thinks that you just turn up on a Saturday to play football. It's not, you must have dedication. When I was at school, I had a lot of friends who would be out buying clothes, going to discos and obviously hanging around with the girls. Not for me. I had to be in bed at nine o'clock. It meant a lot of sacrifice to become a professional footballer, especially in the early years ... if you were adamant to make it. You know, when you're 15 in the 'B' team, you had to prove yourself. Once you're established in the first team, then, obviously, you can relax a bit but then you're always under pressure from people who lag behind but who want to get their chance as well. It meant a lot of dedication. But then the rewards were there to see as well.

Would you have traded football for any other sport?

Absolutely not! I often sit down and think: "If it weren't for football, what would have I done?" I was very good at cricket too. I've even represented Liverpool Schoolboys in cricket as well. So, actually, I did have a choice but I just wanted football.

What does it feel like to have played for both Liverpool sides?

I was born and bred a Liverpool supporter. I stood on the Kop. I dreamt that dream of playing

for Liverpool FC but I had the opportunity to join Everton as an apprentice aged 15. They made promises to me, which they kept. They promised me that they would make me a professional footballer. I went through the 'B' team, the 'A' team, the reserves - I was surrounded by some great players. So, I've never regretted joining Everton. However, in reality, the making of me was going to Ipswich under Bobby Robson. There I found out that Bill Shankly had tried to buy me on four different occasions, which I was disappointed about, since I was not given the opportunity to play under Bill. Then it was a dream come true for me because, after having supported Liverpool FC as a kid and having played against them for many times with Everton and Ipswich, I got the chance to play for the team I supported.

Any fond memories from your short stint in Malta with Naxxar Lions?

The gentleman who I owe everything to for bringing me over is Mr Michael Zammit Tabona. He used to fly me over on a Friday, played the game on a Saturday and if he could I would be back home on a Saturday night. If not, I'd fly

back home on a Sunday, subject to flights. And I did this once every fortnight. Back then, after my football career in England, I had to reinvent myself, as in those days you didn't earn enough money to retire. I didn't stay in football, I went into financial services — I became a financial advisor. So, while I was doing that it was a great release for me to get away from that and still continue playing football overseas. I thoroughly enjoyed the whole experience of coming to play in Malta. I had never visited Gozo. This is my very first time here but I'm pretty sure I'll be back.

I hear you're still involved in Anfield. What does your role, as host in lounges, entail?

Football has moved on. When I used to play, supporters just paid to come to the ground to watch the game. It was just watching the game, popping to the pub, having a fish and chips and then going back home. Now, because it's all corporate, all hospitality, you don't want people to just come to watch the game and go home. You want the people to come two hours before kick-off, have something to eat,



have a drink, and own the club. When Liverpool realised that the other teams were doing it and they were making money, they decided to do it themselves. Other football clubs were using ex-players to host the lounges because the supporters liked it. So Liverpool, obviously, followed suit. It's a great opportunity for me to go, not only to watch Liverpool every week but to go back, sit down and have a beer with some of the players I played alongside and some of the players I used to idolise on the Kop. I get to meet the likes of Ian Callaghan, Chris Lawler, my best friend Terry McDermott, Jimmy Case, David Fairclough, Alan Kennedy, Phil Neal... So, it's great. We meet before, we host, watch the match and then we sit and have a beer afterwards. It's a good social experience!

What would your message to all Liverpool FC supporters be?

What I'd say to any supporter is that sometimes you forget you support the football club. I've got the badge tattooed on my arm so that means I support Liverpool whether they win, lose or draw. Obviously, I like them to win but I'm not that type of supporter who'll say that I'll support you only if you win. Then you're no supporter at all. So it's win, lose or draw, the club and whoever's playing for my club has my support – and that's if they do the job for us! I'd be very critical if they wouldn't. Obviously, it's the manager's job to get the best out of the players. As a matter of fact, I consider Bob Paisley as the best manager in the world, not because of his



tactics but because every player he brought over completed the team. That's genius, that's where the man was a genius. He could buy a player from teams from lower divisions, they'd slot in and become great players. It's not about individuals, it's not enough having 11 great players who are not a team. It's much better to have 11 good players who form a great team. That's the genius of being a manager.

What are your views regarding our club in Gozo?

I have travelled around the world and it never ceases to amaze me that Liverpool are a global football team. I can clearly remember when Liverpool played a preseason game in Melbourne, Australia, two and a half years ago. The hairs on the back of my neck still stand up when I mention that there were some 98,000 supporters singing "You'll Never Walk Alone". I've taped that and still watch it from time to time. That's Liverpool! So it doesn't surprise me to come to a small place like Gozo and go out and meet this smashing group of people who are having a Christmas bash. You've invited me over because I'm an ex-player and you're all Liverpool supporters. It doesn't amaze me, it makes me feel good! Earlier, I went to Charlie's house - boy you owe him a lot! - it's like a shrine to Liverpool. When I pulled up outside, I couldn't believe it's actually got Shankly outside guarding the club exactly like at Anfield. I can only applaud both sets of supporters, in Malta and in Gozo. I know that it takes a lot of sacrifice to come all the way to watch the team play. The amount of money you spend is unbelievable. If you were to be all millionaires, I'm pretty sure you'd be there every week to support the team. So, all I can do is applaud that!

By the time the floodlights fade, football games will have already been translated into numbers. Within minutes, match statistics are splashed on television screens worldwide; sports articles are ready to be printed; comments are uploaded on football websites and supporters start sharing Facebook posts, glorifying some players whilst condemning others. At the same time, football pundits are live on air on pay-per-view channels, sharing their opinion with us. For many people, such media influence is the catalyst for discussion for days afterwards.

Being a fervent Liverpool FC fan, once a game is over, I prepare myself to be on the receiving end of a barrage of comments, which may vary from praise to remarks intended to pull my leg. Others may be so low that they could be interpreted as deliberately trying to hit me below the belt, as if I had been the determining factor for the end result.

As soon as the other results start pouring in, I click on my favourite mobile app to see who

we will be playing against next time and I check their result. This sets me thinking about the way the team should approach that game and I base my arguments in this regard.

Pre-match build-up

Match days come thick and fast. Sometimes I don't even have time to reflect upon the latest game that another match looms. This gets me going through my familiar vicious routine once again: adrenaline starts rushing through my veins, thoughts of past and present performances go through my mind. Will we succeed? Which formation would be best? It doesn't matter who we're playing against, the feelings I get are indescribable and they're always the same.

My first reaction is to predict the result. For some of my mates this seems silly but I find it very comforting as it eases some of the tension off me. It's as if I'm preparing myself for what's to come, to accept the verdict of that game. For further reassurance I check the official LFC



website for updates on injuries of Liverpool players as well as our opponents' team.

Then my focus is diverted towards my good luck charms. I prepare the clothes I had worn for the last game won. I even use a particular towel to shower: I use my lucky red towel for home matches, green for away matches. Superstition tells me not to move any stuff left in certain places around the house if Liverpool had won the previous match.

Match day

Every game Liverpool play feels like judgement day to me. The team's performance will determine my temperament and my behaviour towards those around me. On match day, I get into the mood by playing my favourite eighties music, regularly checking all football-related apps and Liverpool's official channel for the day's line-up.


Keep it up boys, let's look forward to the future with great enthusiasm. Hopefully with plenty of silverware along the way as well!

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

Allow me to conclude this article by listing the other occasions when Gozitan voices in their Scouse accent have been officially heard singing around the fields of Anfield Road:
















